Chuck's Chatter - When's the Next Full Moon?

One of the many privileges, which new clergy experience, is to inflict themselves on small, faithful, unsuspecting, God-fearing congregations. One reason that these folk must suffer young clergy is they cannot afford the full-blown type of pastor. A full-blown pastor is one who has experience under his belt. This full-blown preacher now requires a salary, which is at least half the national poverty level.

As I look back on my early ministry, I cannot but wonder why the folk in these small rural churches put up with such inexperience. To have to listen to the painful efforts called sermons would surely earn these long-suffering people a place in the eternal kingdom. The fact is, these were very intelligent people and yet they still came. It is not the dynamics of the preaching that saved the souls in little rural congregations. If the facts were known, most of us new preachers simply bored the hell out of them.

Young clergy have an extensive **FORMAL** education. What they really need is down-to-earth, practical, useful skills for the work required in pastoral ministry, particularly small, very small, rural congregations. Such courses as: Duplicator - 101; Don't Upset the Pecking Order - 403; The Furniture in the Rectory Came from Aunt Tizzie's Great, Great Aunt Seven Times Removed in 1674, Of Course You can't Get Rid of It - 410; How to Live on Forty-seven Dollars a Month and Enjoy It - 303; Rodent Disposal From Aunt Tizzie's Straw Sofa - 212; Auto Mechanics, Because You Can't Afford to Get It Fixed - 310; and a whole abundance of other equally useful subjects numbered from 100 to 500. The stuff we took at seminary: Greek, Hebrew, systematic theology, eschatology, Egeria, eleemosynarianism, obsecration, just don't cut it with the simple folk of the land in the small, wee rural congregations.

There were many ways this pattern of living manifested itself. One was in the local post-office. Alas, Canada Post has seen to the demise of that one. The local switchboard of the telephone company was another. Alas, Ma Bell has seen to the burial of that fountain of information. Then there was the local general store, still intact, but under the threat of progress. Many small villages had a Soup Strainer, Greasy Spoon, The Used Tea-bag or other such descriptively named eating establishment where kith and kin gathered for a coffee. Alas, McDonald's, Wendy's, A & W, Mr. Sub, aren't the same either.

This story concerns an event that began in the local rural post office and finished on a beach by a lake a mile away. It is 10:00 a.m. Present are the post-master, the preacher, and another individual. We were doing nothing more than putting forth solutions for solving all

the serious problems of the world: crime, wars and communism; stuff like that. If we had not been interrupted, who knows how much better a place the world would now be.

A 50ish male stranger came in to the post-office and said he was looking for some information. His accent told us he was from south of the 49th parallel. After a little bit of chatter to break the ice, mostly by us who needed to know who this interloper in our village was, we found out that he was from a rather large city in the southern part of the United States. We discovered that he had not spent much time, if any, in the country (not Canada, but rural), through his five decades of breathing. He was up on business in one of Canada's larger cities, and had the opportunity to get away from the concrete for several days. He wanted to do some fishing and he had heard that we were considered one of the better spots in which to do such a thing. He asked if we knew a good guide who could take him fishing, and money was no object. I suspect that he had heard tales from his buddies about great fishing and hunting expeditions to the great north and he didn't want to be out-done. He needed a story of his own to take back with him when he went south. We gave him one.

Did we know of a good guide? Of course, we did and he was right here with us. It wasn't the post-master, nor was it the preacher, so it had to be the other guy. He and Stranger began to discuss the fishing in the local area. Guide laid it on pretty thick. Stranger was gobbling it all up ... hook, line and sinker. The more the outsider sponged the information up, the thicker Guide laid it on.

At one point Guide stated that usually the fish were so greedy to bite that one had to take the boat ashore to bait the hook because the fish would jump right out of the water to grab it. Stranger got right excited at this and wanted to know how soon he could get out on the lake. Guide, realizing he had the largest fish of all on the line at this point, wasn't about to quit. He told Stranger that he should come around on a good clear night with a full moon and they could watch the dogfish chasing the catfish around on the beach. Stranger was a tad skeptical about this bit, but seemed to fall on the side of belief.

A date was set. Guide and Stranger went fishing. It was just before dusk on an absolutely beautiful evening when they went fishing. Stranger, remembering what had been said, was busy getting all this new-to-him equipment ready and baiting his hook as Guide was getting the boat and motor ready. As they pulled away from the dock, the hook and bait were dangling over the side of the boat about six inches above the water. Guide spotted a couple of fish just around the dock and gave the boat a bit of a rock as he pushed away. He rocked only enough for the tip of the bait to hit the water just about the way a fly would. Mother Luck was at Guide's side and a fish leprechaun was on his shoulder. A four-pound large,

mouth bass took the bait and ran. Stranger did not realize that the hook had dipped the water. He thought the fish actually came out of the water to get it. By the time he landed the fish, he was mighty impressed to say the least.

He said to Guide, "Guess we'd better head to shore to bait the hook again. When you told me at the post-office the fishing was that good I didn't really believe you." Guide didn't respond, but headed toward the shore so Stranger could rebait his hook. The fishing was great. They had their limit in no time at all. Back at the dock, they unloaded the catch and equipment. Stranger who had not said too much since the first fish came out of the water and took the bait, asked the Guide in all seriousness, "When's the next full Moon?"

Choir Notes - Report of the Interim Music Director

(presented at the Annual General Meeting, St. Peter's Anglican Church, February 25, 2018)

Since I assumed the position of interim music director on October 1, 2017, succeeding our former music director, Tomoko Bonner and her "backup" pianist Keiko Bennett, St. Peter's choir has welcomed new members Lokwing Wong, Lokman Wong, and James Bruce alongside regular members whose dedication and enthusiasm seems unflagging. The newcomers are younger than the longer-term members are, and the balance of young voices and seasoned, dedicated older folks is probably as close to ideal as a modest-size group like ours could wish for. We continue also to enjoy the experience and musicianship of Martha Massey's flute playing and the youthful, energetic enthusiasm of Lin Bevington (whose clarinet playing is only one of several ministries she undertakes among us).

About the selection of music other than hymns

The choir has continued working towards learning a musical setting of the Holy Eucharist in contemporary language (Book of Alternative Services page 185). This has been introduced to the congregation in stages. I hope this process will continue in the new year, depending on the wishes of our new incumbent as he takes up his appointment at the beginning of March. When I first began worshipping at St. Peter's (late in 2016) we were using a setting for which, despite a certain amount of "sleuthing" among parishes in this diocese, I could not discover an original source. My attempts to recreate the often-photocopied handwritten copy (which seemed to be the only available one) in legible notation were remarkably unsuccessful, nor could I discover any other parishes in which it was being used.

The setting, which we are currently working with, is based mostly on the music of Franz Schubert, adapted by composer Richard Proulx. Some of this music appears in the Book of Alternative Services, some in our current Canadian Anglican hymnbook "Common Praise": I have further adapted this music to other portions of the sung Eucharist. I have also borrowed occasionally (again with some adaptations) from other settings found in the Book of Alternative Services, in "Common Praise", or in the United Church hymn book "Voices United".

The choir continues regularly to present anthems. Most of these continue to be my own arrangements of music and words from the Anglican or United Church hymn books or the Oxford Book of Carols.

I am attending a music workshop (sponsored by the Diocese of New Westminster) over the final weekend of February in Vancouver. This workshop promises, if I understand correctly, to address issues including the ethical and legal uses of copyright music, and the use of technology to reduce the environmentally suspect and arguably increasingly impractical (and expensive) use of paper. I am also hoping to have the opportunity of comparing notes with

other Anglican Church musicians and to discover what liturgical music other congregations currently use.

I look forward to the choir's continuing its role in worship — enabling congregational hymn-singing, offering anthems, and assisting in presenting liturgical music. I am finding the role of music director very rewarding. I encourage singers and instrumentalists of all abilities and levels of experience to consider becoming a part of St. Peter's music ministry — to support worship for your friends and neighbours, and to enjoy the experience as I do. We rehearse weekly on Fridays from 3:00 pm to 4:30 pm.



(Nimpkish Regional Meeting, February 17, 2018)

When we arrived at St. John the Divine, Courtenay, we were greeted by a "Blessing Box" filled with foods outside their hall door for all to share. This reflected the holy and welcoming hospitality that we would receive during the day.

Bishop Logan McMenamie led the Opening Prayer and Hopes for the Day. The meeting was chaired by the recently appointed Regional Dean, Anthony Divinagracia, of that parish.

As we prepare for Diocesan Synod, April 20-22, 2018, (at the Songhees Wellness Centre) the round table activities of the morning reflected what we will be considering at Synod with questions such as: "Why does the Church Matter to You?," "Why is it Important that it Continue to Flourish to Serve Future Generations?" and "Living into the Vision at our Church."



In the afternoon, 'Budget and Church Finances' were discussed. Brian Evans, the recently appointed Diocesan Stewardship Officer, offered to show parishes a stewardship video and to preach on Sunday.

The Role and Expectations for Synod Delegates, Regional Deans, Archdeacons, and Lay Vice Chairs were also discussed. The Venerable Alastair McCollum is the Archdeacon for Nimpkish Region. Each region elects a member to Diocesan Council and representing the laity is Denise Ropp, and for clergy, Anthony Divinagracia, both from St. John the Divine. We were delighted to have one youth attend, Amber Santarelli, from Trinity, Port Alberni, and 'the time keeper for the day' and she was elected along with Claire Knowles from St. Peter's, Comox, to Diocesan Council. The Lay Vice-Chair was also elected.
