Dear Parish Family,

Who hasn't heard the comment these days 'What's happened to Christmas"? It's a familiar one particularly as our world is becoming more commercialized and people seem to be getting into the 'buying-spirit' for Christmas as early as October. Once we have made it through Thanksgiving it's as if someone has turned on a switch and told us that December 25th is just around the corner; so we had better increase our energy to get ready for the big day. Already the malls are packed and there is excitement in the air.

I appreciate the sentiment behind that comment because there is a longing within us, I believe, to make the celebration of the birth of Jesus as humble, yet as honourable as possible. We have a desire to move beyond the busyness of the world and come

again to the quiet stable at Bethlehem to behold the true beauty that has come into our world. Calmness and serenity are at the heart of this longing.

The reality which life offers on so many levels is still pierced through whereby people can still know and believe that God is still in control of the world and that God's presence is still felt. Hence, Jesus comes to us in a stable and we can trust what that stable really means.

Yes, a lot has happened to Christmas but the beauty hasn't nor will it ever change. God has come into our world and has given us a new hope and promise for our lives. It is with this powerful gift that we can truly celebrate that joy of this season.

My friends, I want to wish all of you a very happy and blessed Christmas. Furthermore, I know that this will also be my last blog as Jerryann and I enter a new chapter in our lives moving to Mayne Island. The last several years have been filled with much joy and in the midst of change and transformation we have continued to feel God's presence, and we pray that same love will be with all of you.

Chuck's Chatter: Can't Be My Twin, We're Not Related

No, he's not my brother. Remember the story about the lady named Walter? I did say that they were considered my family. If that is the case, then he is my brother. Not really. But he really is the senior brother of the lady named Walter.

Do we ever look alike! We look so much alike that people who have known us for decades, will strike up brilliant conversations with us thinking we are the other, even when we thousands of miles away from either of our homes. The confusion in his home church that arose when we both showed up at the same time for one of the sister's weddings was the source of much fun and merriment.

We do have fun with the situation. We both have somewhat the same warped sense of humour. We have been known to string people along for quite a while, letting them think it's the other guy to whom they are talking. In two particular instances it carried on for several days.

We were both in the military and served on the same bases together. Once we were even posted to same regiment at the same time. We have roughly the same build, the same moustache, the same glasses (issued), and the same lack of hair. We wear the same uniform but the cap badges are different. He ain't a chaplain. There was a time after being in the same unit, that we wound up posted in another city at the same time. We did not work anywhere near each other, but on occasions, people who knew one of us, would trip over the other one of us.

At one point I had to go down town on temporary duty. For a week, I took the same rush hour bus every morning. On this bus there was a young fellow who, I knew from his rank, had not been in the system too long. He was wearing the same cap badge as my "twin". I also knew, from the location that he got off the bus, that he worked in the same office as my "twin".

The first day I got on the bus, he stared at me as I walked to the very back of the bus. He had a regular seat about half way back. He did this for four straight days. If this carried on much longer, his neck was going to turn into a cork screw.

You could see the wheels going around. He wanted to ask, but he didn't dare. I found out later he was a little paranoid of rank, and since I was somewhat higher up the philo-genetic scale than he was, he wasn't about to open a conversation.

On Friday I decided I was going to have a little fun. As I walked down the aisle of the bus, I locked eyes with him. This was the first time I had done so. I had been deliberately observing him without looking him in the eye prior to this. I stopped beside his seat, still looking him straight in the peepers and said, "When you get to the office this morning, I want you to give Captain So and So hell for me, just on general principles." I did not give him a chance to reply as I hurried off to the back of the bus. He almost fell out of his seat as he swung around to watch me go.

My temporary duty finished that day and the following week I was in my own office on the other side of the city. I hadn't even finished my first cup of coffee when the phone rang. I picked it up and all I could hear was giggling followed by someone wheezing and trying to catch their breath. I was a little concerned, but decided it must be a joke worth waiting to hear. That was assuming the "giggling wheezer" lived long enough to speak to me. Caller ID had not been invented yet.

When the caller regained his composure, at least for a brief moment, he managed to blurt out, "I hear you were talking to one of my young fellows on the bus last Friday." I had to admit that indeed I had done so. My "twin" broke up laughing again. He was several ranks higher than the young lad. The lad, as I said earlier, was somewhat intimidated by rank. He had approached my "twin" with a certain amount of trepidation. He said something along the lines of, "Excuse me sir, but a senior officer ordered me, sir, to give you hell just on general principles, sir. I don't know who he is, sir. I didn't recognize the cap badge, sir, but he sure looked like you, sir. I'm not sure I should have really passed the message on, sir. I hope you're not angry with me, sir, but he was a senior officer, sir."

Apparently he was literally shaking in his boots. The fellow was assured it would not have any detrimental effect on his annual Personnel Evaluation Report. He was equally guaranteed that the individual who had given him the order was well known by the intended recipient of the message.

There are several other instances when we have been mistaken for each other. The Base Surgeon, with whom I worked at one base, who was a member of the congregation and knew me well, struck up a conversation with him some 3000 miles from home.

He had seen my "twin" and it was only after talking to him for several minutes that he realized it wasn't me. My "twin" of course, played along until the surgeon figured it out for himself. Neither of us was ever known for giving up easily.

On another occasion, a military police person, just posted to the base on which I was serving, had, in his previous posting, worked in the next office to my "twin". We were both at the Officers' Mess for lunch when he spotted me. Being new in the area, recognizing a face he knew, he came directly over to me and struck up a conversation with me thinking I was He.

Suddenly in mid-sentence, a very strange look came over him, he cocked his head to one side and said, "You're not , but you sure look like him. Who are you anyway?"

He had not told me who he thought I was. I beat him to the punch. I responded by saying, "Oh, you think I am So And So, don't you?" I started to laugh and assured him he was not alone in his mistaken identification.

Oh yes, my "twin" and I do have fun.

Much has happened since the last issue of the Spirit.

We are working towards a new church office computer. The central vac system in the church has been repaired and is in good working order again. Our heartfelt thanks to Rosalie Meier for purchasing two new stoves for our kitchen. What a blessing!

We are meeting with Blair on a fairly regular basis to ensure we are all in the know of parish happenings.

We are pleased that our Church Hall, Narthex and Sanctuary are being rented quite steadily. A great income for our parish!

We are presently looking for a "Kitchen Steward". This would entail care and maintenance of the kitchen. This volunteer would be in charge of making sure the kitchen is clean, that all dishes, etc. are available and that standard supplies are in stock (coffee, tea, etc.). A team could be recruited to make the load lighter. This ministry is important to keep and attract renters.

Elaine, our compost diva, has undertaken to clean up the garden surrounding the St. Peter's sign on Dogwood Street. Her goal is to open up the shrubbery a bit and to make the church more visible from the street. We are also planning on raising the canopy of fir trees that separates us from the Christian School next door. We want to clear the sight lines to ensure a clear view of activities can be had. It is possible that the same treatment may be given to the trees on the berm on Pinecrest Street.

Lynn Vogan continues to look after the counting and depositing of the Sunday offering. She is in urgent need of additional helpers. There must be at least two people present and Wardens cannot be involved. If you can volunteer some time and it does not have to be every Sunday, please get in touch with Lynn or any of the Wardens. Safe Church training is required.

The process for the search of a new incumbent will not commence until January 31, 2017. We will ensure the parish is kept up to date with proceedings. The Bishop will assign an interim priest.

Syrian Newcomers to Canada Update

Our Committee is sponsoring ten people from Syria to enter Canada as UN Convention refugees. A family of five arrived in June and has settled nicely. We now are waiting for another family of three and the other family of two whose son made his way here in 2015.

We are hoping these members will be here by the end of this year.

We work under the umbrella of the Diocese of British Columbia and all of our committee members have attended meetings to help us with our task. We are committed to raising \$150,000.00 and have so far almost reached \$100,000.00 by fundraising and generous gifts from our parish members and others in the community.

As private sponsors for these ten refugees (newcomers to Canada) our responsibility is to provide housing, food, utilities, transportation and clothing (each arrived with one suitcase). So how can we all help? By donating funds directly to St. Peter's and indicating on the memo

of the cheque, "Syrian Refugees." Tax receipts are issued in the New Year.

Some contributors have organized fundraisers with their friends (a dinner, coffee or music party) and donated the funds. The committee has had several fundraisers: dances, dinners, booths at functions, garage sales.

Also anyone can join our group, (meetings are Monday night, 7:00 p.m. in the parish hall), to help us with planning, fundraising and decision making.

It has been a very great privilege for us to work together and get to know our newcomers.

Ladies' Breakfast - December 3, 2016

The muted sounds of conversation, laughter and piano music come from beyond the closed hall door. I stand in the hallway and listen for a while before reaching to open the door. I am greeted by the warmth of the smiles of women in conversation, the glow of tiny white lights hung as garlands and the aroma of breakfast. It is a lovely welcome home after being away for three weeks.

I have come to the breakfast as the Spirit editor, to take a picture and get on with my busy day. But such a welcome is too hard to leave; and the guest speaker is just about to come



forward. Frances, coordinator of the breakfast, stands up and introduces the mystery guest who grew up on the south shores of St. Margaret's Bay, in Fox Point, Nova Scotia, our very own, Jennifer Coolen.

Ausie's Gift

Here we are again, heading into Christmas-time once more, looking forward to when we celebrate the arrival of our Lord Jesus the Christ in our earthly world.

And once again, for some of us it's going to be very different this year from what it's been in the past, because of a change in our circumstances — hopefully, for most of us, for the better; but unquestionably, for some others, not so good.

For Bev Lawrence and for others of us who knew him as a very much cherished, warm and



wonderfully kind, outgoing and humorous friend, there will be a big gap in the form of Austin "Ausie" Lawrence, who from many years ago sprouted an amazing and beautifully developed white Santa Claus beard and moustache and well-filled a bright-red Santa suit.

For some 12 years he went down to the Ironwood Mall (now called The Common) and played Santa for kids and adults alike, who wanted to have their picture taken, telling Santa what they wanted for Christmas. He also did that for many years for the St. Peter's Christmas Bazaar.

Towards the later years, Bev also used to don an outfit to act as his helper, and they did it more for visitors to the Driftwood Mall in Courtenay.

When I visited Bev at her home a few weeks ago, she told me they used to do that every day from late morning until about 5:00 p.m. for 22 days, from December 1 to 23. On Dec 24, they used to tell everyone, of course, Santa would be far too busy delivering gifts.

And that truly was Ausie's gift in that role. Bev told me he always approached it far more from the point of view of Christianity's St. Nicholas than the commercial point of view of Santa.

And that really helped, because some of the requests from quite small children, some of whom were very, very scared by this big red figure and bushy beard and moustache, were for a happy or healthy Christmas, or for no more fighting between the adults, and in full knowledge that they were not going to be getting much in the way of presents or toys, if any at all.

Bev told me some very touching and marvelous stories about how Ausie managed to coax some very reluctant people to visit with him, and he <u>always</u> got down from his seat to their level, even for mentally challenged adults or physically disadvantaged ones in wheelchairs.

Bev also told me that he absolutely never promised they would receive what they asked for, only saying that he was making a mental note and hoped their wish would come true. That took the pressure off the accompanying parents, aunt, uncle, grandparents etc.

And always, always he went along with them in whatever they said about him. When they asked if he really was Santa, he would always reply (as Jesus did), "Well, who do <u>you</u>think I am?" If they said, "Oh, I think you're Santa!" he'd say, "Well, then it must be true." Or if they said, "I don't think you're Santa!" he'd reply, ""Well, I guess I can't be then."

Two of Bev's best stories were about the journeys down to Courtenay or coming back. On one occasion, she said, she was driving down, with Ausie already arrayed in his red uniform. When they drew up to the lights to turn left onto the Inland Island Highway, a truck drew up alongside to go straight ahead to the airport. The driver glanced to his left and his eyes nearly popped out of his head when he spotted Santa in the passenger seat of the vehicle. Needless to say, he was delighted to be able to tell his young passengers, who was sitting in the car next to him and smiling towards them.

The other story was about Ausie driving Bev home one night while still in his outfit. They were stopped in an RCMP roadblock and an officer came up to the driver's window. He had to ask, "Have you been drinking at all tonight?"

"Not at all, officer," said Ausie in full truth.

"Very good, sir," said the officer. "On your way; and be good!"
