Confession

The priest invites the people to confession.

word, and deed, by what we have done, and by what we have left undone. We have not loved you with our whole heart; we have not loved our neighbours as ourselves. We are truly sorry and we humbly repent. For the sake of your Son Jesus Christ, have mercy on us and forgive us, that we may delight in your will, and walk in your ways, to the glory of your name. Amen.

The priest pronounces the absolution.

The Peace

Priest The Peace of the Lord be with you all.

People And also with you.

We share this ancient sign of reconciliation and respect by making a profound bow to one another.

Celebration of the Eucharist

Altar is prepared with the offerings of bread and wine. the priest then prays a prayer offering these gifts to God.

Priest The Lord be with you.

People And also with you.

Priest Lift up your hearts.

People We lift them to the Lord.

Priest Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

People It is right to give our thanks and praise.

The priest continues with one of the Eucharistic prayers from the authorized books.

Holy, Holy, Holy Lord, God of power and might Heaven and earth are full of your glory, Hosanna in the highest.

Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord, Hosanna in the highest.

Therefore, according to his command,

People we remember his death, we proclaim his resurrection,

we await his coming in glory.

As the Eucharistic Prayer ends the priest elevates the bread and chalice.

Priest As our Saviour taught us, let us pray.

People Our Father in heaven,

hallowed be your name,

your kingdom come,

Give us today our daily bread.

Forgive us our sins

as we forgive those who sin against us.

- We receive only the Bread and we understand that we have received the fullness of the Sacrament.
- Please remain in your seat until the usher directs you forward for Communion
- Use the centre aisle to go forward and to return
- Remove your mask as you approach and replace it as you return
- You may remain in your pew and Communion will be brought to you if you prefer. Please tell the usher.
