Wardens' Report to Annual General Meeting

The past year has, without doubt been an exception for us on many different planes.

We began the year with the knowledge that our Incumbent, Lincoln McKeon, had been selected to be the new Bishop of the People based in Kamloops. Lincoln commenced his duties there in May and we wish him every success in his new diocese.

We also had the retirement of our own Bishop, Logan McMenamie. This left us without our own priest for some time.

We established a committee to begin the search for a new incumbent but we needed the permission of a new Bishop to begin the actual process of searching out a new incumbent. Under the leadership of Rick Monchak a new committee was formed and has carried out some of the needed preliminary work.

The diocese did select an interim priest for us in the person of Rev. Catherine Hall. Cathie is from Nanaimo and has a vast experience in the Church. She leads in EFM across the country. Cathie is now working in the office two days a week but also does a lot of work from home.

One of the requests we had of her was pastoral care and she has done a wonderful job in reaching out to our parishioners.

This all, of course, has taken place during the horrible experience dealing with the affects of Covid 19. We have not been able to meet in Worship since March except for a brief period when we experimented with reduced seating and attendance. This was done under the direction of the diocese and a great credit goes to Lois Tirebuck for her work in laying out our seating arrangements for that time. Unfortunately as the virus spread we had to close down our services completely but Cathie has us set up to have our services available on-line through ZOOM.

Things did not stop at St. Peters' all together.

Lois set up a phone tree to reach out to our members to keep the community strong. We had a drive by blessing on All Saints Day organized by Cathie which saw several people who were avoiding contact drive by for a blessing by Cathie.

In the spring a fantastic amount of work was performed by a group, primarily ladies, who trimmed the shrubbery about the church and we culled a lot of dead and dying trees from around the boulevard. This really allowed more light into the Sanctuary.

Next commenced a project, led by George Wagner, and assisted by many hands to repair and repaint the siding all around the church and out buildings. As well a shout out to Cloverdale paints who not only advised me of when they would have a significant sale on the paints, but agreed to hold that price even though we were not doing the project at that precise time and to carry us through until we were finished.

In the fall we were able to complete the long awaited up-grade on our heating system. Again, George, with his expertise as an engineer oversaw the project to its' completion.

Due to the generosity of our members we were able to have all of these works done without creating a debt.

We have one big project to do and that is to replace the heating/air-conditioning unit on the hall. The maintenance contractor advises that this unit has a very limited life span. They have manage to eke out a bit more time but tell us that it is going to fail fairly soon.

Our review of the financial statement shows that at the moment we are holding our own financially but that is only because we do not have a full time incumbent with all the cost that brings. We will need, in the future, to increase attendance, or offerings, or both to meet expenses going forward.

There are a couple of resolutions that we need to address from this gathering.

The first is to approve David Fitzsimmons to resume his calling as a Deacon in this parish. I am very pleased to nominate David for this position. I have known him for quite some time both as a member of Saint Peters' as well as from outside associations and gladly recommend his nomination.

Wardens report (cont.)

Many will recall that David was ordained previously but due to a now resolved health issue he needed to step away. David is now recovered and wishes to resume his duties with us doing outreach ministries, Christian Education and EFM. Wardens and council have met with David and support him in this Ministry subject to diocesan approval.

The second is the subject of marriage policy regarding same sex marriage. Same sex marriage is legal both in civil law and church law. Cathie felt that we should clarify our policy in recognizing our parish's recognition of and support of these ceremonies being performed at St. Peters'. We will require a motion to revise and enshrine this in our wedding policy.

Lastly I want to thank you for the opportunity, once again, to serve our church and wish in the incoming council well in guiding us forward.

Report of the Priest-in-Charge

I have now served St. Peter's Campbell River for 6 months as I write this report. It has been great to meet and get to know many of you in person, on zoom, and by telephone. I do know that this has been an especially challenging year for the parish.

Last January the Rector, Archdeacon Lincoln McKoen, was elected bishop of the Territory of the People and a process of farewell began as Lincoln and Tanya began their transition.

Looming over the horizon at the same time was COVID-19, though it's name was not widely known at that moment. Within weeks Dr. Bonny Henry initiated a shut-down of all but essential services. Suddenly there was no rector and no public worship. I have heard how the parish met the challenge in a variety of ways. Meetings were held outdoors and socially distanced, worship was shared online by a neighbouring parish, people kept in touch using a phone tree.

By the time I began to serve the parish there was work ongoing on the building itself. Landscaping was brought up to date, repairs to the siding were underway and so was painting the exterior of the building. New furnaces had just been installed. Bishop's Warden Lois Tirebuck developed a plan for safe gathering in the church and we were able to begin having in-person services again in September. We followed the guidelines on Wednesdays and Sundays and had very good attendance. A Liturgy Committee was formed to guide our planning. On All Saints Day, November 1, mindful that not everyone could safely attend services, we held a 'drive-by' blessing at the entrance to the church. It was well attended and deeply appreciated.

In mid-November Dr. Henry again ordered public worship suspended. This time we resumed by having services on Zoom. Again the Liturgy Committee guided our planning. Services are well attended and people are expressing appreciation for the opportunity. We do not know how long this will last but with the long-awaited roll-out of the new vaccines we are hopeful that we will be able to resume when it is safe. It has been very helpful to have the advice of Dr. Shiubong Wong and Lois Tirebuck as experienced medical professionals throughout this time.

We have now purchased our own zoom account and some parish leaders have already been trained to set up meetings and some people have stepped forward to offer help with managing the technology for services and meetings. Some who were very reluctant users of the program are now quite adept and teaching others how to manage. Training will continue to be offered.

Meeting the pastoral needs of the people in the parish has been challenging. Neither the clergy nor friends can visit hospitals or hospice or make home visits. I have used the telephone and zoom to have conversations with people who need caring support for difficult times in their lives; this has been of some help. From time-to-time I have met with people in the church, always masked and appropriately distanced. I am glad to be able to do this when possible. We have had two deaths in the parish since I

arrived and held one funeral. The funeral was only 10 people including me and I was glad that it could be arranged because observances such as these are very helpful when someone has died. There is a wedding which will take place in March and there will only be 10 people present that day as well. We are trying hard to keep in touch with folks who are not part of our Sunday services. I am making as many calls as I can. We are also printing and delivering copies of the leaflet to households that cannot access online services – at least those that are willing to receive it. If you know of someone who would like to keep in touch this way please leave their name at the office.

In the course of conversations about use of the buildings it became clear that it was time to update the hall use policy and the marriage policy. A new hall use policy was approved by Parish Council in January, though the fee schedule was left open to be added later. The marriage policy raised the question of whether the people of St. Peter's were willing to have a policy that allowed for the marriage of all couples who could legally be married in the Anglican Church – including same sex couples. As you may know these weddings are authorized in this diocese and an appropriate liturgy has been provided. However, it seems to me that it is important that the people of the parish as well as the clergy be willing to move in this direction before action is taken. There will be a motion on the agenda for the consideration of the congregation in this meeting.

As you are certainly aware we are understaffed at the moment. In the fall we hired a secretary, unfortunately she needed more hours than we could provide. Strong support has been offered by both Lois Tirebuck and Holly Finn who have greeted visitors and responded to calls and email during (and outside of) office hours. St. Peters would not function well without their strong leadership. We have not had a paid musician during the time when services have been suspended. We have received the resignation of Brock Lupton as well. Georgia Smith has volunteered her services to play for the one hymn each week but we need other volunteers to allow her to have a break; so far no one else has stepped forward.

Long-time parish member David Fitzsimmons and the wardens, parish council, and I have been in conversation about the possibility of him entering into diaconal responsibilities in this parish. A draft covenant has been prepared. Parish Council supports this unanimously but it was decided that the matter could be referred to the Annual Meeting for further conversation and a final decision. There have been educational items in the bulletin and more will be forthcoming.

Many people who know about Dr. Bonnie Henry's ruling on gathering for public worship assume that the church is 'closed'. I believe that the contrary is true. The church is open; open as long as its members are engaged in ministry, as long as the church prays for the community and the world, as long as those who are poor and in need are served. I know that is happening here in Campbell River and will continue to happen when COVID 19 is over.

The church is also setting an example of care for the community by engaging in practices that keep the community safe. We worship and meet online, we wear masks and keep a safe distance. This is our duty and our service to the community.

We move forward into a hopeful future with the new vaccinations, but we know there are challenges ahead. Some of those challenges are in the wider world, with new varieties of COVID making an appearance. Some of those challenges are within our own selves as we find ways to cope with anxiety, isolation, loneliness and other consequences of COVID. Some of the challenges are in our parish as we seek ways to remain a vital and functioning parish community in these difficult times. Some of the challenges are spiritual as we seek ways to know and trust that God is present with us, even, and especially, during this time of pandemic. May God grant us Grace, perseverance, and courage to face into this time.

St. Peter's Sunday School Annual Report 2020

This has been a strange year, to say the least. We began the year as we always do, with two classes, a primary class with an average of 4 children and an intermediate with an average of 6 children. Diana and I co-coordinate St. Peter's Sunday School and are very happy to have Keith Vickery and Sandra Ohlinger continue to support the Sunday School by teaching the Preschool-Primary class.

Then March 13 arrived, along with Dr. Bonnie Henry's announcement to stay home at Spring Break; do not travel. By the end of Spring Break, schools were closed as well as all gatherings, including places of worship, and that included us. So, we began St. Peter's Virtual Sunday School. Each week, from March 29 to May 29 we emailed lessons to the families of the Sunday School for the children to work on with the help of their parents or older siblings. We also posted the lessons on St. Peter's website. Lessons began with: "Welcome to St. Peter's Virtual Sunday School! While we cannot meet together on Sunday morning, we can still meet virtually to learn about Jesus by reading the Bible, talking about what we've read and doing some activities. Get together with your family and do these lessons when it works for you or phone your friend or Grandma who you can't get together with to talk about these lessons. Have fun!"

After the summer break, no Sunday school lessons were permitted when church services resumed. From September 13 to November 22, we provided lessons which the children could work on independently while they sat with their parents when they attended the 10:00 o'clock service on Sunday.

We continue to use the curriculum Whirlhouse Lectionary from Sparkhouse. Rewritten lessons, virtual and independent, were based on the curriculum. It is a very user-friendly curriculum and the children enjoy the lessons and materials provided each week, in person until March, virtually from April to May and independently from September to November. No lessons were provided in December.

Registration was well below the 14 children who were registered in September 2019. 4 children attended regularly. Another 3 children attended from time to time.

Archbishop Melissa Skelton will be retired by then. Provincial Synod is scheduled for Sorrento...but it just might be on Zoom too...

2020 Building Maintenance Report

The following is a listing of the building maintenance activities at St Peter's in 2020.

- Replaced the 2 end of life electric furnaces with gas fueled forced air furnaces. This included adding ducting to heat the Rector's and Secretaries offices. WIFI programmable thermostats were installed on the 2 new furnaces as well as the Hall H&V unit to reduce our heating fuel consumption by setting back the temperature set point in periods of non-occupancy of the building.
- Cleaned the heating and return air ducts in the Church and Hall at the time of the new furnaces installation.
- Painted the exterior of the Church, Hall and 2 Garden Sheds by a group of dedicated volunteers over the period from May to August. Did some minor repairs to the wood siding and exterior doors as part of the painting process. 24 gallons of paint were used for this project. Extensive refinishing was done to the oak main doors by Phil.
- Replaced the worn and weathered wood siding on the east, south and west sides at the top of the office structure with Smart Siding.
- Replaced the emergency door openers on the 2 west exterior doors in the Hall.
- Replaced the sinks and faucets in the men's washroom.

National to Local - Creation Matters!

In the past year it has been almost impossible to meet face to face at the church because of COVID 19 but during the summer and early autumn restrictions were lifted somewhat so we met in our garden overlooking the Community Garden and magnificent scenery.

Since we are part of the Anglican Church of Canada we often embrace the programs that have been initiated by various committees or Synods of the ACC. At General Synod 2019 (it sounds like a long time ago but essentially we have only met face to face for six months after that), two Resolutions were carried and are being implemented locally which were on elimination of "Single Use Plastics/Styrofoam" in our parishes and to implement the" Season of Creation."

For the Season of Creation (September 1st to St. Francis of Assisi Day – October 4th) many resources are being developed by "Creation Matters Working Group." Locally, we are fortunate that Rick Monchak, who is very knowledgeable of forests, has led us on very educational walks through the Beaver Lodge Lands! On St. Francis of Assisi Day 2020, as we socially distanced and with limited numbers we explored: "Three Ecosystems and Climate Change!" Rick tells us that if you get to the beaver lodge pond early in the morning you might see the beavers at work! We identified many species of trees, the awesome soil beneath a healthy fir tree, diverse vegetation of each ecosystem, and how the changing climate is affecting them.

Some ask: "Why the Season of Creation?" Simply it is to inspire us to love/care for our planet and to fulfill our Baptismal Covenant and the 5th Mark of Mission which states: "To strive to safeguard the integrity of creation and sustain and renew the life of the earth."

Locally we also embraced the elimination of single-use plastics/Styrofoam – with a motion at last year's AGM. Council wrote up an agreement for rentals, so that these products would not be used during rental time... Unfortunately during this pandemic there is an excess of plastic over-wrap, packaging, and many food products are in single-use plastics. Since we are not meeting at the church it is not an issue presently, but it is for the environment!

SYNOD REPORT: Election of the 14th Bishop

Bishop Logan McMenamie retired May 1, 2020 and the election for a new bishop was to take place on June 27, 2020. Due to Covid the election was deferred to September 26, 2020 via Zoom and Simply Voting. The nomination process materials were received and we were asked to read and digest all the information to help us stay informed as well as to ensure we had a clear sense of the role of the bishop, issues facing the church at this time and the qualities and characteristics we were seeking in our next bishop to enable us to be as confident as possible in our choices.

There were7 candidates and each were to submit a profile and short video. 4 candidates were from B.C., 1 from New Westminster, 1 from Calgary and 1 from Durham/Newcastle. What a wonderful opportunity to "meet" these lovely people in their own settings and see what was most valuable and sacred to them and their vision for us.

We were invited to use this prayer as we prepared for the election: Lord Jesus, May your wisdom be our wisdom, Your vision our vision, Your will our will, That we may seek, find and call one who will shepherd your people, nurture reconciliation, love your creation and speak Hope to the Church and the whole world in your name. Amen

September 26 at 9:00 a.m. started with the opening Eucharist followed by the voting at 11:00 to participate in the election. In between voting we were treated to images of diocesan activities and recorded music from the Christ Church Cathedral choir. Also after each ballot we were given the opportunity to join a chat with a few other delegates in a "breakout room". There were 15 rooms and 164 delegates. You were given a room # to go into after each vote if you so desired. I met wonderful people and reconnected with others I had not seen for a while as well.

It was a long day event that started with 7 candidates and it was between the last 2 with clergy and laity having different views. By approximately 4:30 and the majority achieved we welcomed the Rev. Anne Greenwood-Lee from Calgary to the diocese of Islands and Inlets as our Bishop elect. A historic moment as the first woman bishop in the diocese with almost 9,000 views from around the world. Once chosen the cathedral bells rang!

The consecration and Installation was live streamed on January 30th, 2021 at 11:00 at Christ Church Cathedral. I was very moved by the whole ceremony, words spoken and sang and especially when Bishop Logan presented Anna with the eagle feather from the elders at Alert Bay that he had received from them. We give thanks for the technology to be able to witness and participate with the "front row seat" in this historic event.

Financial Report for the 2021 AGM

While it has been a difficult year for everyone, I have to say that I am so pleased with the support the church has had, and will continue to have financially. You are amazing! Thank you so much for your consistent and willing provision for the continue well-being of our church home.

We ended 2020 with a Net Income of \$12,578.41. While our envelope and electronic collection plate offerings were down from the budgeted number, we still brought in \$138,152.02. Of course, our fund raising efforts took a very big hit, both for the church and for our community. They are always so much fun!

You may note that we received \$6,190.94 as a "wage subsidy". This is the CEWS money received through the Diocese as COVID-relief for wages. There will some continued book entries regarding this which you will see in 2021. The Diocese has been taking care of us from a distance.

Also taking care of us have been George Wagner and Tony Smith. I want to thank them for their work behind the scenes, getting our maintenance issues settled.

We have shown a budgeted loss for 2021 in the amount of -\$43,158.00. We tried to get a balanced budget but it just wasn't going to work as our income would then have to be very unrealistic and we didn't want that. We don't expect to have our Ministry in Parish numbers as high as they are budgeted but wanted to continue to show them as if we had a full time minister.

I wish you all the very best for a happy and healthy 2021. We will get through this, with help from our Lord. God bless, Holly, Treasurer
