
First Reading: Isaiah 35:1-10

It is difficult to imagine that the Son of God would be born in such humble circumstances—the princesses and princes in England are born in a safe, clean, and warm hospital, attended by highly trained medical people. He strength and courage shine through these stories.

Blessing of the Creche

This Creche is a gift of the Halstead family to St. Peter's.

It was said that St. Francis of Assisi popularized the Creche, a depiction of the Holy Family with visitors and surrounded by animals. Sometimes the depictions allow us to forget the poverty of the family that could find no room in the inn. The Creche is a reminder to all that we are called to shelter the Child in our hearts.

The birth of the Child Jesus was announced by the Angels. They did not go to centres of power but to those who served. They appeared to shepherds, at work in the fields, caring for sheep who were needed by the people for food and for their wool. We don't encounter real shepherds of sheep often in our present life but there are shepherds among us.

The Gospel of Matthew tells of Magi—those who have knowledge and power, who came from far away, bringing gifts to the infant king. We actually don't know how many Magi there were but we do know there were three gifts. The three gifts brought by the Magi speak of the nature of Jesus. The gift of gold is brought to a king. The gift of incense is offered to the Divine. Myrrh is a grave spice, meant to preserve and perfume the body of the dead person. There are modern Magi among us: our Indigenous Elders, teachers and professors, leaders in the business and political world.

Sixth Reading: Matthew 2:1-12

Almighty and everliving God, you revealed the incarnation of your Son by the brilliant shining of a star. Shine the light of your justice in our hearts and over all lands, and accept our lives as the treasure we offer in your praise and for your service; through Jesus Christ, our Saviour and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

Matthew's Gospel continues with the story of the flight into Egypt. Mary and Joseph and the infant Jesus become refugees, fleeing from an oppressive king who feels threatened by the child. There are many refugees in our world today, this parish has been a part of refugee ministry and has made a difference by that service. The flow is unceasing and will not change until there is justice and peace in our world.

Almighty God, our heavenly Father, whose children suffered at the hands of Herod, receive, we pray, all innocent victims into the arms of your mercy. There is no service Christmas Day or December 26; you are encouraged to visit another parish online.


