Refugees Among Us

This parish has sponsored refugees in its recent past. What has been your experience of that or another refugee sponsorship? Most of the refugees the church sponsors in this diocese and across Canada are leaving behind oppression, danger of death, and a life of fear. We feel glad to bring them to this welcoming and safe place. But we have refugees among us as well, who also are in need of safety and help, who also have a life of fear.

Who are they?

Some of those among us who would be refugees if they could are intimate partners who live in fear of physical, emotional or sexual violence. Sometimes elders are abused by those who are meant to care for them. Sometimes the abuse is physical or emotional, sometimes the abuse takes the form of financial exploitation. Do these count as refugees?

Some among us are homeless. This may mean that someone is 'couch surfing', sleeping in the home of friends. Sometimes they are living in their cars, sometimes they are living out of doors. There are many, many reasons for this, every one has a story. Sometimes it is PTSD from a trauma, sometimes it is a mental health issue, sometimes addiction, sand there are many other reasons. Whatever the reason they are homeless do these count as refugees?

There are some among us who are slaves, people who heard promises and came to Canada full of hope, who are now working in massage parlours, brothels, or on street corners. They are male as well as female. Many have been told lies about the consequences of escape, or they have had their passports taken, or they do not speak any English and don't know where to find resources. They live in fear. Do these count as refugees?

The Holy Family were refugees, fleeing to Egypt to escape the wrath of Herod. They lived among foreigners until Herod died and it was safe for them to return. They left their home, family, friends, neighbours, and livelihood to find safety. Do these count as refugees?
